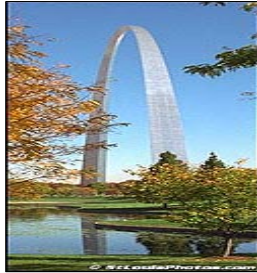
Tour #1: Gateway to St. Louis Introductory Tour

This itinerary includes views of Laclede's Landing, the Old Cathedral, the Old Courthouse and Busch Stadium, a tram ride at the Gateway Arch, a stop at the New Cathedral in Midtown, a drive through the Central West End and a Forest Park overview.

Your Destination St. Louis tour guide traces the history of St. Louis beginning with the city's original settlement, Laclede's Landing. It is now a nine-block historic district filled with renovated turn-of-the-century buildings housing shops, eateries and offices. Visit the famous Gateway Arch, the Nation's tallest monument, which commemorates the gateway to the west for thousands of 19th century pioneers. Here, take a tram ride to the top for a unique bird's eye view of the city or watch a documentary on how this magnificent steel structure was created. Just east of the Arch, pass the excursion riverboats and the floating casino that call the Mississippi River home.

Enjoy a view of the Old Cathedral, the oldest cathedral west of the Mississippi. Across the street is the Old Courthouse, the setting for cases involving slavery, the fur trade and equal rights. Of these cases, the Dred Scott Freedom Trial is the most notable. You will pass Busch Stadium, home of the St. Louis Cardinals and St. Louis Union Station, which was once the busiest rail terminal in the world. Today, Union Station has undergone a magnificent renovation and is home to a luxury hotel, specialty shops and restaurants.

At the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis, also known as the New Cathedral, you will see one of the largest collections of mosaics in the world – 84,000 square feet in 8,000 shades of color! Explore the historic Central West End neighborhood, the Barnes-Jewish Hospital Complex and the mansions bordering Forest Park, fine examples of the "Golden Age" of St. Louis at the turn of the century. Forest Park was the site of the 1904 World's Fair and is one of the largest city parks in the United States. Today, the Park houses the world-famous Saint Louis Zoo, the Saint Louis Art Museum, the Missouri History Museum at the Jefferson Memorial, the Science Center and the Muny, among other attractions.

This itinerary includes a tour of the Anheuser-Busch Brewery and a stop at Ted Drewes Frozen Custard.

Your Destination St. Louis tour guide will familiarize you with the rich history of the colorful Busch family en route to the King of Beers – the Anheuser-Busch Brewery. Situated in a 100-acre complex with over 70 red brick structures, the Brewery buildings are known for their unique architecture and several are National Historic Landmarks.

During the tour, you will see the World Famous Clydesdales, the Fermentation Building, the Packaging and Bottling Plant, the Brew House and a film about the brewing process. No visit would be complete without a stop in the hospitality room to sample the family of Anheuser-Busch products.

After leaving Anheuser-Busch you're in for one last treat. Before returning to the hotel, savor a sweet treat as you stop at Ted Drewes Frozen Custard, a St. Louis tradition since 1929, located on historic Route 66. Enjoy a specialty "concrete" shake that is so thick you can turn it upside down.

This itinerary includes an overview of Forest Park. Your motorcoach will shuttle between the Missouri History Museum, the Saint Louis Zoo, the Saint Louis Art Museum and the Saint Louis Science Center and Planetarium. Lunch is available on own at each attraction.

“Meet Me in St. Louis” at Forest Park – the site of the 1904 World’s Fair and one of the largest city parks in the United States. Today, Forest Park is home to the world-renowned Saint Louis Zoo, the Saint Louis Art Museum, the Missouri History Museum, the Saint Louis Science Center and the Muny, the largest outdoor theater in the country, among other attractions.

Your day begins with a visit to the Saint Louis Science Center and Planetarium. Adults and children alike learn the wonders of science and technology through hands-on exhibits. While there, you may visit the Omnimax Theatre and the James S. McDonnell Planetarium which is one of the nation’s leading space educational facilities, focusing on astronomy, space sciences and aviation. Hop aboard the Boeing Space Station where you learn what it’s like to live, work and play in space. Within the space station, you’ll see more than 9,000 stars created by the Zeiss Planetarium Model IX. While at the Science Center, you will have a chance to explore three floors of exhibits, the Omnimax and Planetarium on your own.

You may also enjoy a visit to the Missouri History Museum at the Jefferson Memorial. Travel back in time to explore the history of St. Louis from 1764 to the present, including the early days of aviation with Charles Lindbergh’s historic transatlantic flight and a special exhibit honoring the history of the 1904 World’s Fair, the “World’s Greatest Fair.” Next stop is the Saint Louis Zoo, recently rated the #1 Zoological Park by *Zagat*. Begin your visit at The Living World, an interactive visitor/education center. Then visit the more than 3,500 residents living in their natural habitats on 90 acres. At the Saint Louis Art Museum, there is something for every art lover from the Renaissance to the modern era. With something exciting around every turn, you’ll see why it is considered one of the top ten art museums in the country. The motorcoach will shuttle between each attraction and tour guides will give passengers a shuttle schedule.

Experience a unique view of St. Louis history with a visit to two of its oldest and most well loved neighborhoods for an evening of food, drink and fun. You’ll start the evening at Laclede’s Landing, a nine-block area of century-old brick and cast iron facade buildings, which conjures up images of steamboats, busy levees and the “riverfront days” of another time. Today, you’ll find a lot more than history lining the charming cobblestone streets. When dusk falls, Laclede’s Landing sparkles as the city’s premier entertainment district, where live music reigns. You’ll relax in one of the more than two dozen restaurants and nightclubs, where you can enjoy crudités and one of our locally brewed beers, a glass of wine or a cocktail, or perhaps the “specialty of the house.”

En route to your dinner site, you’ll pass through some of St. Louis’ most historic neighborhoods. The newly wealthy German Beer Barons developed Compton Heights in the late nineteenth century. The Lafayette Park area features newly renovated Victorian mansions and row houses surrounding the oldest public park west of the Mississippi.

“The Hill” is your dinner destination - as St. Louisans affectionately refer to the home of a large Italian community in the southwest part of the city. Important as an industrial and residential area since the 1800s, today it is home to many elegant and moderately priced Italian restaurants, entertainment, bocce alleys, groceries and bakeries. You will dine at Favazza’s Rose of the Hill restaurant, one of the flagship Italian restaurants in St. Louis. You will enjoy a truly memorable dining experience at Favazza’s.

For dessert, you will stop on historic Old Route 66 for a famous St. Louis tradition since 1929 – Ted Drewes Frozen Custard. Known for specialty “concrete” shakes so thick you can turn them upside down, you will be sure to remember this tasty treat for years to come.

This itinerary includes a stop at the Missouri Botanical Garden with a private tram ride, as well as a driving overview through Compton Heights, Soulard, the Brewery Complex and Lafayette Square.

Enjoy nature at its finest at the Missouri Botanical Garden. The oldest botanical garden in the country and a National Historic Landmark, the Garden has been internationally recognized for horticulture, education and scientific research since its founding in 1859. It is truly a St. Louis treasure!

A guided tram tour will wind its way through the 79 acres of flora from a variety of diverse climates. Visit the Climatron, the first geodesic dome greenhouse based on Buckminster Fuller's futuristic design. Included is a visit to the 14-acre Japanese Garden, considered one of the finest outside Japan. There will also be time to explore your favorite areas on your own.

Next, explore the real character of St. Louis through three of its most historic neighborhoods. The first neighborhood, *Compton Heights*, was developed in the late nineteenth century by the newly wealthy German beer barons. *Lafayette Square* features renovated Victorian mansions and row houses which surround Lafayette Park, the oldest public park west of the Mississippi. *Soulard* is a delightful, old working-class neighborhood, which boasts the oldest continuous farmer's market west of the Mississippi River. You will not be able to miss the 100-acre Anheuser-Busch Brewery Complex with over 70 red brick buildings, several of which are listed on the National Historic Registry.
